A reading from the Book of Jonah.

So Jonah made ready and went to Nineveh, according to the Lord's bidding. Now Nineveh was an enormously large city; it took three days to go through it. Jonah began his journey through the city, and had gone but a single day's walk announcing, "Forty days more and Nineveh shall be destroyed," when the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast and all of them, great and small, put on sackcloth.

Sacred Music Notes

Today, William Byrd's music is now celebrated as the pinnacle of Tudor music. However, this was not the case when it was first composed. During the mid- to late-1500s, Catholic worship in Protestant England had to be celebrated in secret behind closed doors. Catholic choirs were not permitted and Byrd never would have heard his motets or Masses sung publicly in churches or cathedrals. It was composed for use in the privately celebrated Masses and sung by whomever was in attendance: family members, guests and servants. In public, he was a member of the chapel royal and one of England's foremost musicians, but, in private, Byrd was a practicing Catholic and much of his music was composed for that medium. Later in his life, he spent less time in London and more of his time with the Catholics in Essex. His psalm setting, Teach Me, O Lord, alternates between a soloist and the full choir. Since it was composed as a prayer of the Church and intended for liturgical use, its form allows for the maximum clarity of the text.

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
